Kirk closed by coronavirus scare, may re-open on April 5

The seven days between Palm Sunday and Easter are traditionally referred to as Holy Week. The week is always set apart as a defining moment in the church calendar.

In 2020, the week is bracketed in a uniquely unnerving manner. As is duly noted we have suspended all gatherings at the Kirk because of the coronavirus.

These are emergency measures taken by our Session until at least Palm Sunday on April 5. The closures may last even longer.

Pastor Bill Bailey, in his Pastor's Corner remarks on page 2 of this



newsletter, reminds us we need "not be captive to fear"... "we are not alone."

Given the opportunity, he would surely remind us on Palm Sunday

that in the face of calamity we can move ahead in reassurance.

The lectionary text for 2020 Maundy Thursday is from the Gospel according to Matthew from Jesus's trial through to his crucifixion. We are told Bill will lead us through that account as he will on Easter Sunday be reassuring us of the triumphant victory over death that Jesus proclaimed in message and example.

Dotty Rector, in her Choir Notes on page 15, tells us the Kirk Choir will enhance all of this both instrumentally and in harmonic voice.

"Rejoice, the Lord is King. Your Lord and King adore!" whatever the circumstances.

As people of faith, we cannot live in fear


By the time you read this Pastor's Corner, worship services at the Kirk will have been canceled for three weeks due to the coronavirus. Writing this on March 15, it is still uncertain how things will unfold.

Session will meet weekly to stay abreast of issues

24 hours of intense training for Pilgrimages

Twice a year, spring and fall, the halls and rooms of the Kirk reverberate with the call of Mu Chas, Table Chas, and Palanca Chas.

Having just read this factual statement, you may still be left with the questions “who, why and what?”

The Spanish word “cha” is equivalent to the English “helper,” and each of these names refers to a group of people training to help staff a Pilgrimage weekend. Mu Chas are the music leaders, Table Chas serve and clean up at meals, and Palanca Chas deliver a variety of God's special gifts to participants at the weekend.

These words originated in Spain in the 1930s after the Spanish Civil War left people devastated and the Catholic Church divided.

Out of all that grew a movement called Cursillo, meaning to “awaken in lay leaders and young persons the deeper meaning of their faith and instill in them the fundamentals of being a Christian in all aspects of their lives.”

By 1957 the Catholic Cursillo program was brought to Waco, Texas, by Spanish pilots training at Lackland Air Force Base. From this beginning it ultimately spread to Episcopal, Methodist, Lutheran and Presbyterian denominations, often with other names like Walk to Emmaus, Great Banquet, and Presbyterian Pilgrimage.

What is occurring each spring and fall at the Kirk are training sessions for people from all over the state who, having been through a three-day Renewal Weekend in their own spiritual journey, are gearing up a month ahead to staff the next renewal weekend.



It involves an intense 24-hour (3 p.m. Friday to 3 p.m. Saturday) period of planning and team building to prepare the staffers to facilitate a setting where each new participant may plot his or her own God-drawn journey.

Imagination leads to beautiful napkins by Carol Sue Williams

Carol Sue (Ridings) Williams was born in Hamilton Mo., birthplace of James Cash Penney (J. C. Penney's), quilter Jenny Doan (Missouri Star Quilt Co. and Missouri Quilt Museum) and Brooklyn Dodgers Hall of Famer Zack Wheat (1910-1927).

She grew up the middle child of Marion and Loraine Ridings alongside her brother John and sister Sallie who we came to know as late Kirk member Mrs. Lee Huss. Marion was editor and publisher of a weekly newspaper while Loraine was a professional bookkeeper and seamstress by avocation. From her, Carol Sue inherited a serger.

If you, like I, have no idea what that is, read on.

Carol Sue attended Missouri's Christian College (later Columbia College) for two years before beginning her career with Kansas City Power and Light Company, initially in the accounting department before rising to a supervisory role in customer service.

She met her husband Bill, 11 years her senior,

at work and they spent 27 years together. She retired from her job when Bill did in 1994 and they moved to Hot Springs Village. Sister Sallie and her husband Lee were here already and, raised a lifetime Presbyterian, Carol Sue and Bill joined the Kirk as well.

Having already been a person drawn to service (30 years with Daughters of the American Revolution-Treasurer, and 61 years with Philanthropic Educational Organization (P.E.O.) – President) Carol Sue became heavily involved in Presbyterian Women and served as chapter moderator.

Retirement gave Carol Sue added time and energy to use her inherited serger, a specialized machine that trims, folds and stitches material to form a neat, straight hem.

Material is cut to size and, fed carefully into the device, it does the rest. With creative imagination, Carol Sue makes colorful, attractive and functional tea and dinner napkins which she sells at craft fairs.

Travel, volunteer service, and crafting fill Carol Sue Williams' retirement quite nicely, thank you very much.

Choir planning glorious music for a glorious time

For Christians, the week approaching and including Easter is the holiest week of the year. The Kirk choir will lend its musical selections to worshipping our Lord at three services.

Palm Sunday is April 5, the day we remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, palm branches waving him on. The anthem will be *Take Up Your Cross*, a beautiful four-verse setting of an 1833 text by Charles William Everest to the English folk melody DANBY. The tune is found in our hymnal setting as *Incline Your Ear; O Lord, to Me*, on page 844.

Our second Holy Week Service will be on the evening of April 9. This is Maundy Thursday, where we commemorate Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples.

The choir will be graced with the cello accompaniment of Barbara Reeve. The anthem chosen is *O Sacred, Wondrous Love*.

This anthem combines two beloved hymns and represents a



touching tribute to the Savior's redeeming work on the cross.

The scene is set with the haunting sounds of *What Wondrous Love is This*, while the vocal lines concentrate on the familiar *O Sacred Head Now Wounded*.

The culmination of the week, of course, will be Easter Sunday. Easter is the glorious celebration of victory over death in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The choir will move down the center aisle in white robes. They will sing *To the Lamb on the Throne*, combining music by Dan Forrest, one of our favorite composers, with a text by Charles Wesley, one of the greatest hymn-writers of modern times.

The tune is a hymn some may remember in previous hymnal editions as *Ye Servants of God, Your Master Proclaim*. Brass and timpani will join our organ in the glorious music for the entire service.

What a marvelous time! Message and music will glorify our Lord, remembering His sacrifice and His resurrection.

Love Lunches are the main Sunday meal for many

When we say “Love Lunches,” people ask, “What’s that?”

This endeavor began years ago when a gentleman named Ken Anderson of Hot Springs asked a homeless man if he had something to eat.

He was told every day but Sunday meals are prepared at the Salvation Army, 115 Crescent Ave. To remedy the Sundays problem, Ken sold a car for \$6,000 and sent a check to Project Hope Food Bank, and Love Lunches began.

Kirk in the Pines member Betty Reece became involved in working and recruiting. After she and her husband Charles moved back to Tupelo, Miss., Cheryle and Stanley Dean took over the ministry.

Six Sundays a year a group of Kirk volunteers goes to the Salvation Army to make Love Lunches.

Three hundred bologna and cheese sandwiches are made and bagged by an assembly line of workers. Two sandwiches, a napkin, a small pack of crackers or cookies are placed in sacks with a Bible verse. Kool-aid is also served.

Preparation begins at 11:15 a.m. The lunches are distributed from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. This happens outside regardless of the weather. Folks are often lined up ahead of time waiting for their Sunday meal.

After a blessing, the sack lunches are given out. Often we are able to give out ramen

noodles or puddings. We always receive a “thank you.”

Volunteers also bring clothing, some new or gently used. Shoes, socks, underwear, pants, shirts and other clothing are greatly needed. There is a bin under the coat rack in Hoffius Hall for any donations.

We feed not only the homeless but folks down on their luck or perhaps not able to make ends meet. No one

leaves hungry. Last year, Love Lunches served 7,587 needy souls, all made and handed out by church groups from Hot Springs and Hot Springs Village.

Book describes open secret of God's love for us

“In the Gospels, Jesus tells us there exists a certain secret, hidden wisdom which, should we grasp it, is the key to unraveling all the deep secrets of life,” according to Ronald Rolheiser in *The Passion and the Cross*.

Do you know the secret? The hidden wisdom?

For Rolheiser, “the hidden secret that holds the key to everything is the cross: the wisdom of the cross and the brokenness of the one who died on the cross.”

In merely five chapters of *The Passion and the Cross*, we move from the tribulation of Christ in the garden of Gethsemane to the crucifixion, and finally the resurrection. Rolheiser begins with Christ's suffering in the garden of Gethsemane:

“The agony in the garden is many things, but, first of all, it's Jesus's entry into the darkest black hole of human existence, ... of bitter misunderstanding, rejection, aloneness, loneliness, and humiliation, and the helplessness to do anything about it.”

Three chapters follow focusing on the crucifixion, seen first as the most revolutionary moral event in history, pointing as it does to the “deep secret” that “in giving love away in total self-sacrifice...we ourselves come to what's deepest and fullest in life.”

Second, the cross is the deepest revelation of God as a “redeeming God,” not a “rescuing God.” For Rolheiser, the cross is also salvation. “Jesus took away the sin of the world by taking in hatred and giving back love.”

Finally, for Rolheiser Christ's resurrection is the vindication of what we all know is true, that love ultimately prevails and that the resurrection is “not just a question about one day, after death, rising from the dead, but it is also about (our) daily rising from the many mini-graves within which we so often find ourselves.”

In our own lives, we know something of misunderstanding, rejection, loneliness, and humiliation at the hands of those we love. We, too, know

suffering. We know something of our own sacrifice for love's sake. We too know something about redeeming Grace. And we know something about resurrection and renewal.

The Passion and the Cross is a profoundly spiritual meditation on the open secret of God's love for humanity through the suffering, death, and resurrection of Christ. Read it to know the “secret to life” revealed in the Gospels.


Kirk golfers, spouses and friends enjoyed dinner and fellowship at Raffaella Rose Restaurant at Cortez.
