Sylvia Tate leaving Kirk at the end of May

Teaching Elder/Lay Pastor Sylvia Tate will be resigning at the end of May and moving to her home in Jonesboro, Ark. Her letter of resignation to Session read in part:

“After three months of prayerful consideration, I have made the most difficult decision of my life. As Pastor Bailey announced on April 14, I am resigning as Elder Leader/Lay Pastor for the Saturday Informal Worship Service. However, I will continue to serve in this position through the month of May.

“These last two years have been emotionally and spiritually tumultuous times for me. April 10th marked the two-year anniversary of Paul’s death. June 30th will mark the one-year anniversary of my son’s death. July 24th will mark the one-year anniversary of my granddaughter’s husband’s death. These are life changing, life draining occurrences that happened in a very short period of time.

“The outpouring of love and compassion from members of this Kirk, as well as from the Session and the staff, has been monumental

in enabling me to continue my ministry to the Lord and His people here in this place, during these troubled times of loss ... But now I am ready to go home.”

Her resignation was accepted with, in Pastor Bill’s words, “deep gratitude for your ministry at this Kirk and a prayer for His continued guidance as you relocate.”

Sylvia final service will be Saturday, May 26. A reception in her honor will be Sunday, May 27, following the morning worship.

Rev. Bailey indicated he will conduct the Saturday evening services or arrange substitutes at least until September to allow the session to make adequate permanent arrangements.

Sylvia will be personally and professionally missed but we do wish her God’s tender mercies and continued blessings.

The Spirit can comfort and empower

Pentecost Sunday will be May 20 this year.

Pentecost is the Greek name for the Jewish Festival of Weeks – Shavuot. It is an annual festival in Judaism celebrating the giving of the Torah to Moses.

For Christians, it marks the end of “The Great Fifty Days” and “the birthday of the church.” Pentecost always falls on the eighth Sunday, counting Easter Sunday, and is celebrated for the gift of the Spirit.

No longer physically present, Jesus is now present through the power of the Spirit, filling and empowering the church to bear witness to Jesus’ resurrection and to work for the Kingdom.

In the New Testament, a variety of witnesses try to describe the Spirit’s presence and work in our lives.

In the Fourth Gospel, the Spirit is referred to as “the *paraclete*,” a Greek word often translated “comforter” or “counselor.” For the Gospel writer John, the Spirit is a comforting presence that sustains us in times of trouble. The Spirit, says, John, reminds us we are not alone, that we belong to God.

In Luke’s writings, *The Gospel* and the *Book of Acts*, the Spirit is less a comfort and more of a troublemaker.

It is the Spirit that calls the earliest followers out from behind locked doors and into the world to bear witness to the Kingdom in word and in deed. It is the Spirit that leads the church out into the world to confront injustice.

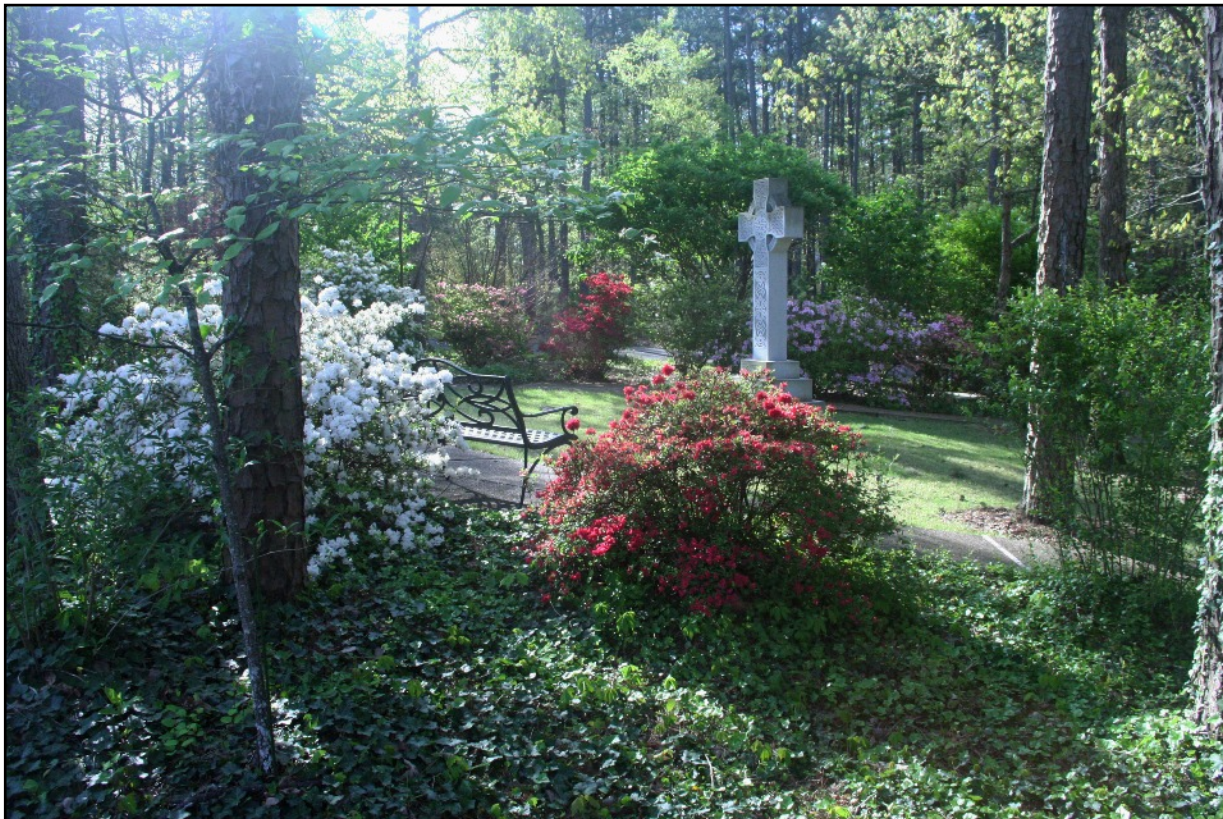


When the Church would rather play it safe and comfortable, the Spirit often gets Peter and Paul, and the others, into trouble with the powers of the world.

For Paul, the Spirit calls the church into a community, provides gifts of the Spirit that enables believers to live together.

According to Paul, the Spirit also produces fruit needed for living together ... “Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.” It is the Spirit’s presence that empowers us “to bear the burdens of each other,” so the church may be strengthened and built up.

However we may speak of the Spirit, whether as a comfort or an empowering presence, as Jesus’ followers we are heirs to this same tradition. May the Lord grant us all strength and courage to follow wherever the Spirit leads us this Pentecost Season.

The theme will be Favorite Baseball Teams. We encourage

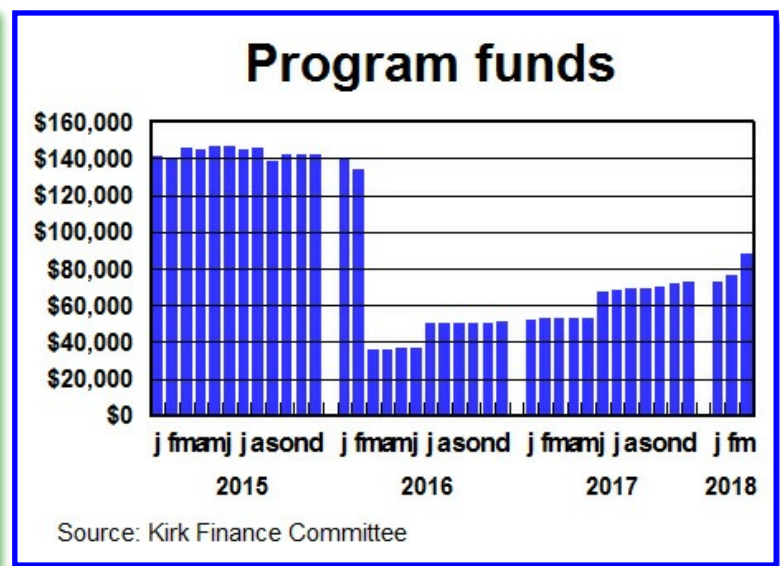
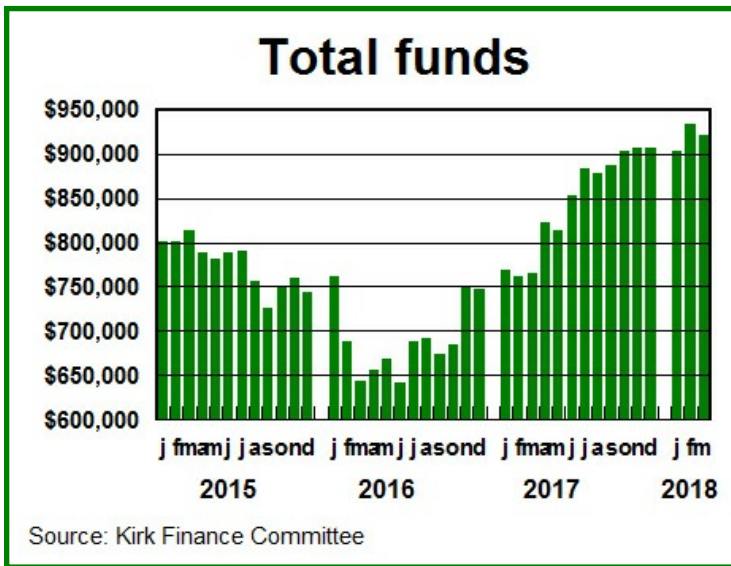
everyone to wear their favorite team T-shirt or cap and come join the fun. This is also an excellent time to invite a neighbor or friend who might be looking for a church family.

Robert Sonnen wears three hats at the Kirk

Before moving to Hot Springs Village, Robert Sonnen was a banker and underwriter dealing with real-estate construction.

Since becoming a member of the Kirk in August 2012, Robert has assumed three new roles.

His first role involves running the sound board for 10 o'clock Sunday services and other events in the sanctuary.

Even though he had no sound-system experience, Robert responded to a plea from Jack Bullard, who was then in charge of the Kirk's sound systems. Today sound-equipment management is the responsibility of the Building and Equipment Committee. Barron Gage is its moderator.

When Robert first started on the sound board, he only knew how to turn the microphones on and off. Then two years ago all the equipment was replaced with a computer.

With the conversion, a new program (Audacity) had to be learned. No member of the sound group knew how the new system worked. It was an opportune time to learn both the new system and how a sound board works.

Robert got to work and learned in great part by watch instructional YouTube videos. He now trains others in the Kirk and has written an illustrated instruction manual.

When training a new person, he tells them "the most important job is to listen."

"You have to know what is going on so you know which button to push and/or adjustments to make," he explained.

In addition to taking his regular turn on Sunday mornings, he is available for consultation when problems arise.

Another role Robert fulfills is photography.

As a member of the Communications Committee, Robert is often asked to take photos at church functions. He also takes most photographs of our new members.

Robert has an impressive background in photography, having attained his Certified Professional Photographer designation in 2002. He served as president of the New Mexico Professional Photographers Association.

While living in the Albuquerque area, Robert operated a photography business in addition to having a full-time job.

The third role Robert fills is as substitute sexton. Robert temporarily filled in when Dan Stockford resigned as sexton. He then showed our new sexton, Paul Stivitts, "the ropes" and continues to help when needed.

Elegant lunch at historic site included in deluxe bus outing

A one-day deluxe motor coach trip to historic Marlsgate Plantation near Scott, Ark., and Heifer International Headquarters in Little Rock will be offered June 28 and is open to all.

History buffs and antique admirers will enjoy touring the Greek Revival Marlsgate mansion overlooking the waters of Bearskin Lake now under new ownership.

Visitors will experience the gracious way of life enjoyed on the old plantations of the Arkansas Delta. An elegant lunch will be served at the plantation, including Marlsgate chef's signature dessert.

Famed as one of the most resplendent plantation homes in Arkansas, the 32-room mansion is filled with beautiful antiques.

It's many features include stately Doric columns over 40 feet tall, original beveled-glass windows, handcrafted woodwork, Carrara marble fireplaces and sculpted metal ceilings.

Traditional English gardens with "walls" of 20-foot-tall holly hedges and antique statuary provide an elegant setting.

From Marlsgate, it's a short ride to the Heifer International Headquarters in Little Rock (photo below) for guided tours of their Exhibits Museum and their Green Building headquarters.

Heifer is one of the Kirk's mission projects. This guided tour promises to provide further insight into Heifer's goal of "teaching a man to fish."

Since its founding 70 years ago, Heifer's philosophy still inspires their work to end hunger and poverty throughout the world.

Learning how they go about it is interesting to all ages.

Sponsored by the Kirk's Education and Member Outreach committees, the trip to Marlsgate and Heifer is a perfect one-day summer outing. It will be fun making new friends and being with family and neighbors. It's a great opportunity for Kirk members to help grow our membership reaching out to others in the community.

Different perspective can be very revealing

The story is told of a man who visited his doctor, complaining of excruciating pain in every part of his body.

To illustrate the point, the man extended his hand to his shoulder and cried out. The same thing occurred when he touched his elbow or his hip or his knee.

The doctor ordered an extensive series of X-rays to deduce the source of the man's problem.

The man returned to the doctor's office in a few days with an urgent, yet hopeful, desire to receive an answer to his problem, a successful diagnosis and a cure. Was there a pill to be taken or a procedure to follow to effectively ease the debilitating pain?

The doctor said there was. X-rays revealed the man had fractured his finger. Set and stabilize the offending appendage and the man would be good as new in a few weeks.

Perspective is often revealing.

I recently had occasion to study the Gospel of Luke 19:1-9, an apparently quite straight-forward story of Zacchaeus's, a man who climbed a tree so he might see Jesus. However, R. Allen Culpepper, a dean at Mercer University in Atlanta, writing on Luke in the New Interpreter's Bible of 1995, encourages us, in our study, to contrast Zacchaeus with the rich young ruler of Chapter 18:18-30 who rejected Jesus.

Dr. Fred Craddock of Emory University points out in Harper's Bible Commentary, that when Jesus refers to

Zacchaeus as the true "Son of Abraham," he is being genealogically accurate.

He is being accurate as well in equating the man's faith to that of the founder of the nation.

In summary, E.J. Tinsley, a professor of theology at the University of Leeds in England, declares in the Cambridge Bible Commentary: "The whole incident, found only in Luke, turns out to be a reproduction in miniature of the meaning of the (Jesus's) mission..."

It is not such a simple story after all.

For the Introit, the four ladies have chosen *My Voice*, a testimony to the unity with which we need to approach the worship of God.

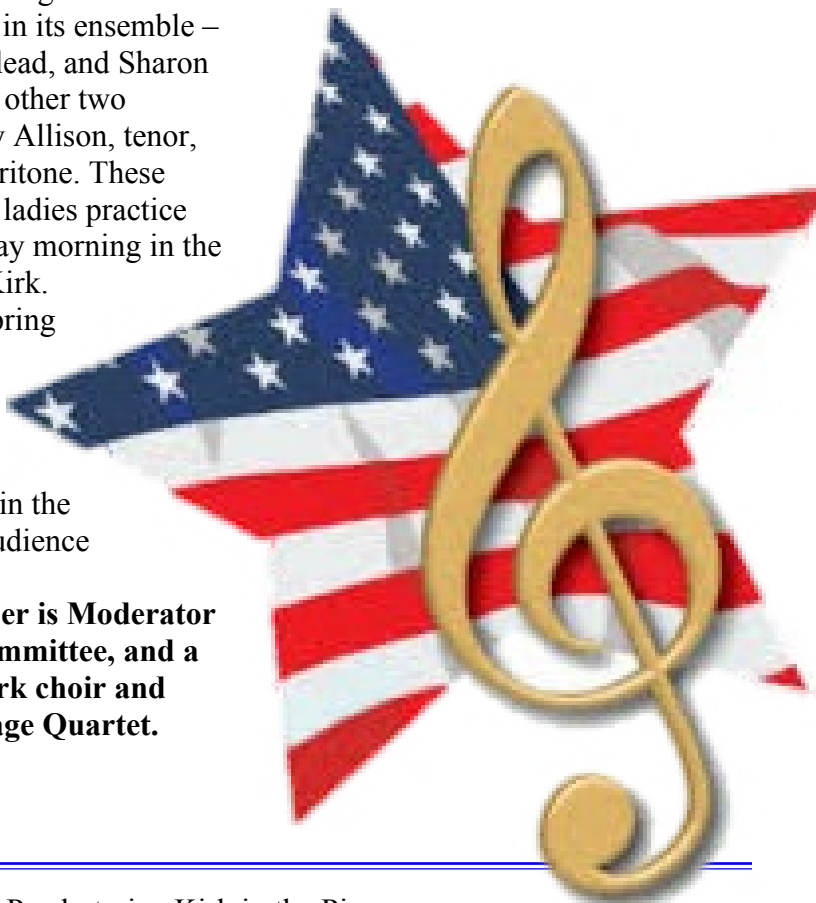
The anthem is a celebration of gratitude for all our gracious God provides, entitled *My Tribute*.
