Administration oversees a 'well-oiled machine'

The official purpose of the Administration Committee (ADCOM) is straightforward:

"To provide for the administration of the program of the church. One of its primary functions is to assure that the church office is operated in an efficient manner. This requires the employment of capable administrative persons, fairly compensated and given the necessary support, guidance and equipment.

"ADCOM is to provide support to other committees in standardizing common policies and procedures and in coordinating their administrative functions."

The committee has a moderator, vice moderator, two or more at-large members of the congregation, and the pastor who serves in an ex-officio capacity.

As Moderator Jim Erickson says, there are two fundamental sides of the coin:

1. To manage the office through the establishment of budgets and tackling the "nuts and bolts," such as assessing the wear and tear on

Feel free to have a good laugh when you're giving

Those of you who attend worship regularly at the Kirk will recognize this verse from St. Paul: "God loves a cheerful giver" from his *Second Letter to the Corinthians (9:7)*. It is one of my favorite verses and I often use it to introduce the offering at the Kirk.

There are several Kirk members (you know who you are!) who almost always leave the sanctuary on Sundays with tongue-and-cheek questions: "What if you're not so cheerful? Will God accept my gift, even if I'm not so happy about it?"

They're teasing, of course, but it is still an interesting question.



My stock answer – yes. To the Lord, all gifts are acceptable, even if you're a grumpy giver. It takes time for some to acquire the spirit of joy – the freedom that comes with giving. It is interesting. The

Greek word Paul uses in II

Corinthians 9:7 is *hilarotes*. It's the same root word from which we get our English word "hilarious!" God loves a *hilarious giver*!

I take this to mean giving is to be done willingly, gladly, joyfully, and perhaps even hilariously!

I understand that this kind of giving is not always so easy. The truth is, most of us are "anxious givers." We worry so much about having enough, not just now, but enough for the future.

We know we should be giving cheerfully, but we



worry about the what-if's of life. None of us want to be a burden on our children or other loved ones. Sometimes we give, but are not too happy about it.

Paul in *Romans 12:8* suggests giving is a gift of the Spirit. It is not simply something we learn at home from our parents, or achieve out of sheer will power.

At its heart, giving is a gift that God works within us. Having received God's free gift of mercy and grace, we joyfully, gladly, and – yes, even with hilarity, share with others. Giving is about trust – letting go of the need to control everything.

We believe the Lord is a generous giver. God has freely given us all things in Christ. I sometimes imagine God smiling when seeing some of us finally learn to let go a little and give with a generous heart.

Some of you have discovered the joy of giving. The Kirk has some of the most generous people I have ever met – giving joyfully of their time, talent and treasure. My wish for all of us is this: *never pass up an opportunity to experience the joy of giving*.

2. Managing personnel which has even more complexity. Coaching employees is central to this function and the Kirk has a formal review process which all personnel undergo, including and requiring that information is gathered on an annual basis from three or four individuals with whom or for whom each employee has worked.

Compensation is predicated on these reviews and the committee recommends salary increases and bonuses to the Session.

It should be noted the entire process supports the notion that feedback is a regular occurrence and not a

once-a-year phenomenon.

Additionally, the Committee considers the kind and frequency of training the staff should undergo to ensure excellence in every aspect of the workplace. Implementation of compulsory education regarding sexual harassment illustrates this point.

As Jim says, things at the Kirk "are working like a well-oiled machine."

In great part, this is because we have the "right people on the bus" and provide them with the support and structure to be successful. We can thank the Administration Committee for its thoughtfulness, diligence, and commitment to creating the most professional of environments for our people.

My Gift series well attended and helpful to all

Fifty-eight persons attended one or more sessions or requested a book with all the information regarding the recent five-part *My Gift to My Loved Ones* series. The Education and Congregational Care Committees, which jointly sponsored the series, thanks all who participated in the successful series.

The topic of the third, in the final three sessions held, met June 19 and addressed *Honoring My Bodily Remains*.

The first speaker, Gary Clarkson from Caruth-Hale Funeral Home, was very informative about services they can provide. They offer a free consultation with you and your loved ones to help you make decisions together before your death.

Sharon Gardner, the Kirk's Finance Moderator, spoke about the Memorial Garden, Columbarium and the Texas Presbyterian Memorial Fund. She handed out a pamphlet with pricing and instructions on how to reserve a place in either the Memorial Garden or the Columbarium.

The third segment of the session was about Genesis, the whole-body donation program.

Jackie Morris from Genesis handed out new packets and answered questions for both those already signed up with the program and for those contemplating signing up.

The *Honoring My Bodily Remains* program was well received and everyone left the session understanding it

is best to have a plan A and a plan B in place.

The fourth session on June 26 was a workshop led by Pat Kuntz, Education Moderator at the Kirk, on *Creating an Ethical Will*.

Pat used the book *The Ethical Will Writing Guide Workbook*, by Barry K. Baines, M.D., as the source for the program. She said ethical wills are not new, but there seems to be a renewed interest in recent years.

Dr. Baines wrote: "The Hebrew Bible first described ethical wills 3,000 years ago. They were first transmitted orally close to the time of death. Later they became written documents attached to legal wills. Today, they are most often written as a separate document and shared with family and community while the author is still alive."

The fifth and final session was on July 3. Janie Smith, Sally Fink, Sharon Gardner and Pat Kuntz were leaders assigned to answer any additional or lingering questions on the topics covered in the series..

A big thank-you goes out to Chip Johnson, Kirk Sexton, who set up tables, made coffee, and helped in any way we asked.

An added thank you to Beverly Schaumburg and Chris Taylor-Wilmoth, Kirk office staff, for all the copies they made and their insightful suggestions. These individuals were invaluable to the success of the event.

Shelter offers many things for homeless men

In 2003, Chuck and Jan Laggan saw a need for shelter for homeless men in Hot Springs and established a rescue mission with the help and financial support of local churches and community organizations.

In 2005, they acquired an old 7,500-square-foot steel-shell warehouse for \$5,000.

Architectural plans for the mission were created by the Laggan's oldest son, Daniel, a registered architect, and renovations began in 2006.

For 17 months the Laggan's worked side by side with volunteers and contractors to finish the reconstruction while continuing to raise operating support to begin operating Samaritan Ministries of Hot Springs (SMHS) at 131 Sanford St.

From the beginning, many individuals, businesses, churches and organizations have volunteered their time, contributed supplies, gift-in-kind donations and prayers.

SMHS opened on Nov. 23, 2007. The total cost of acquisition, major renovations, equipment and furnishings was approximately \$325,000.

The day SMHS opened, the program was totally debt-free.

Men are often sent to SMHS by local agencies, churches, hospitals, and other homeless individuals. All homeless men are welcome to stay at the mission for up to 10 days each month.

The goal is to provide a safe, clean, comfortable shelter with hot meals, showers and clothing.

If a homeless man is willing to commit to participating in a longer-term, life-changing program, they can enroll in SMHS's Resident Program. It helps them gain self-esteem and self-worth, restore them to a structured lifestyle, and assist them in becoming employable, productive and find affordable housing.

This program is provided without cost.

Volunteers from the Kirk have been cooking one evening meal a month for the last 10 years. We've seen many a ragged, defeated homeless man shuffle through our food line.

Most are one timers, never to be seen by us again. Some we see again the next month, cleaned up and in better clothes. Some enter the residential program for awhile and then are off on their own.

Some are chronic street people; we used to call them winos. Some are well groomed and look shocked and sheepish to be there, but some crisis in their life gives them no alternative to spending the night in a homeless shelter.

Some are mentally ill. Some are drug impaired, though they have to pass a drug screen to be admitted into the building. It is very diverse crowd.

After serving everyone, I like to take my plate and go out into the dining room and find the most bedraggled, hopeless man in the place. They are always alone. I ask if I can join them and sit down. I never ask them a question other than did they enjoy the meal.

I have had some fascinating conversations. *Ed Baldwin is a member of the Missions Committee.*

Council help Mountain Pine children with \$2,300

The Village Interfaith Council is an organization that provides fellowship, knowledge and education for clergy and lay leaders. It is open to all faith traditions and all churches in Hot Springs Village have been invited to attend. Currently 16 churches belong to the Council.

This year the council's focus has been on studying the wider community needs related to hunger and literacy.

While there are many missions responding to these needs, we felt an under-supported area was food support for children in the summer months. Students received meals as well as additional food supplies on weekends during the school year, but resources are slim during the summer.

In our study, we saw the greatest need was in the Mountain Pine area.

In response to this need, the principal and a junior high math teacher have undertaken oversight of the Mountain Pine Community Fund. It provides food for families in need.

Some of these families live with multiple families in a single dwelling, trailers and even tents. During the summer children and families have access to the faculty and staff by contacting the school office as well as contacting teachers through the school website.

Arrangements can be made for a family to pick up needed items. Or delivery to the family is provided if needed.

After careful consideration of all areas in need of funding for hunger, we felt this group had the most gaps and we could reach more children – sheltered and unsheltered.

The Interfaith Council voted to offer monies for hunger to the Mountain Pine Community Fund. Churches of the Council have contributed to the fund in order to show a united effort of care and love from Village churches to those children (and their families) in need.

With generous contributions from the Kirk and other area churches, we were able to present a check for \$2,300 for this program.

Nancy Patton and Sam Arant represent the Kirk on the Interfaith Council.

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The Creed brings our community together

How can reciting a creedal statement in worship be a counter-cultural act?

Luke Timothy Johnson, in his book *The Creed*, makes that bold assertion. Speaking of the many Christians who recite the creed in worship, he counters that:

"In a world that celebrates individuality, they are actually doing something together. In an age that avoids commitment, they pledge themselves to a set of convictions and thereby to each other. In a culture that rewards novelty and creativity, they use words written long ago.

"In a society where accepted wisdom changes by the minute, they claim that some truths are so critical that they must be repeated over and over again. In a throwaway, consumerist world, they accept, preserve and continue tradition."

Dr. Johnson continues to write about what the creedal statement is and what it is not. Each chapter focuses on the meaning of this tersely packed language Christians recite each week in worship.

As a former Benedictine monk, the creedal language used in *The Creed* is from the Nicene-
