

It's time for us to pay attention to the places where God is busy doing his special work

Unlike our secular calendars, which begin the year on Jan. 1, the Christian New Year began this year on Nov. 27 – the first day of Advent. As always, we will be lighting the traditional candles of hope, peace, joy and love.

The word Advent means "coming" and is a reminder that our faith calls us to live between our Lord's two comings. We live between the ages, trusting in our Lord's first advent and looking forward to his second at the end of times.

Session Retreat, Oct. 31 to Nov. 1, 2016

Violence in the Church was a topic discussed by the Session at the retreat. There were several options reviewed

How can we protect the congregation during services? At this time, it was suggested members be especially vigilant for anyone who seems to be unusually nervous. It was suggested the doors be locked after the service starts.

The Session believed this was not in the best interest of the

congregation and would not be effective as a deterrent if someone intent on causing damage was already in the Kirk when the service started.

The Session also looked at the safety of the staff and others working in the church during the week. Plans are to lock the outside doors in Hoffius Hall in the afternoons. If the sexton is working, the doors will be unlocked.

When he leaves, they will be locked.

If you have a committee that will be meeting in Hoffius Hall and you do not have a key, get one at the office but return it after the meeting and make sure the doors are locked when you leave.

The main door to the sanctuary will be locked at all times during the day and night.

Procedures for making our church safe will continue to be evaluated. Video surveillance of the doors to identify anyone entering the church is being studied to ensure we have the best coverage possible. Better lighting around doors will enhance the coverage.

Elves from the Kirk make Christmas merry for more than 80 adults with mental illness

Thanks to a band of elves headed by Kirk member Joyce Leeming, residents of Small Group Therapy in Hot Springs will have a merry Christmas.

Small Group Therapy (SGT) is a non-profit residential treatment center in Hot Springs for 80-85 adults with severe and persistent mental illness. Ages range from 21 into their 70s. Most residents are indigent. Many do not have family to provide gifts or to visit during the holidays.

"This is the only gift the majority of them receive," said Joyce.

The elves are members of Friends of Small Group Therapy who volunteer each year to shop for and wrap gifts of clothing, toiletries and other necessities the residents cannot afford.



Each fall, Debbie Crone, administrator of the Day Treatment Center, helps the clients prepare a holiday wish list, something they look forward to doing all year.

Then Joyce and her elves get busy shopping and wrapping. A dozen Kirk members are regular



shoppers and wrappers and more join in as their schedules allow.

"This massive project would not be possible without them!" Joyce said.

Joyce, whose son, Lewis, is a resident of SGT, began Friends of Small Group Therapy in 2001 to help raise money for non-program items, such as gifts for the clients at Christmas. Individual donations allowed spending \$5 on a small gift to each client.

The group also received a grant of \$1,000 from Hot Springs Village Community Foundation to help with a dental health start-up program.

In 2003, Friends of SGT, three members strong, used email chains to solicit furniture and kitchen needs for 12 new HUD apartments, including Christmas trees and door wreaths.

The following year, the group of elves grew to six, one of whom was responsible for a \$20,000 grant from the Hubbard Foundation for clients' dental care.

Thanks to donations from individuals, businesses and service clubs, the amount raised for each client's Christmas gift has grown to \$25.

Fundraising efforts haven't stopped there. Thanks to donations from service clubs and churches, three defibrillator machines were purchased for SGT's day-treatment center and the two 24/7 residential-care facilities.

In 2012, Friends of Small Group Therapy received a Community Service Award from the Mental Health Council of Arkansas for raising over \$123,000 for SGT

Like other fund-raising organizations, Friends of SGT has seen a decrease in donations in recent years.

"Since 2008, donations have dropped over 50 percent," said Joyce. Almost all of the contributions come from Hot Springs Village, and a large percentage comes from Kirk members, Kirk Mission and Kirk PW.

"We are actively seeking more Friends in Hot Springs and surrounding areas."

Village Big Band draws standing-room-only crowd to hear toe-tapping celebration

The Kirk sanctuary was standing room only as the Village Big Band presented "Songs of Inspiration and Patriotism with a Beat" on Sunday afternoon, Oct. 23.

Made up of Hot Springs Village residents, the band replicates the instrumentation of the prominent jazz/dance bands of the 1930s-60s, such as Glen Miller, Benny Goodman and Count Basie. Directed by Bill Morgan, the band has performed at most Village venues as well as the Arlington Hotel and Garvan Gardens in Hot Springs.

Augmented by the Kirk's own Donna Toney on piano and Randy Toney as guest vocalist, the program opened with *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* sung by the audience and backed up by the band.

Jazz spirituals *Jericho* and *Just a Closer Walk with Thee* had the audience nodding with the beat, and inspiring standards *You Raise Me Up* and *I'll Fly Away* triggered enthusiastic applause.

Dawn arrives late this time of year in the Danube River Valley. It is nearing mid-morning by the time advancing rays of the autumn sun slip over the Black Forest-capped foothills of the Carpathian Mountain Range.

They brighten and warm the swift-flowing waters of the legendary Danube River. This current navigational pathway to Vienna, Austria, is skillfully controlled by a masterfully engineered series of locks and dams.

Everyone invited to join on Christmas Eve


Won't you join fellow Christians on Christmas Eve to sing favorite Christmas carols?
