

A helping hand

Challenged golfers benefit from Faulk's skills

Dennis Faulk, a member of the Kirk and an avid golfer, was on the Property Owners' Association Golf Committee in 2002 when a Villager asked the committee to provide a golf program for physically challenged persons in the community. The Villager had suffered a stroke, so the matter was personal to him.

The idea appealed to Dennis's desire to help others, and he accepted the challenge.

The POA board was consulted. They were supportive and helped the group buy two handicap golf carts in 2003.

Coronado Golf Course was selected as the appropriate course, and the personnel there agreed to participate. They continue to provide free tee times and golf balls.

Since the program's inception, Dennis has been recruiting players and volunteers.

When asked what keeps him going, he says, "The participants really enjoy it. They enjoy the camaraderie most of all. They like being together with others who have disabilities; they feel comfortable laughing at themselves and each other."

The Physically Challenged Golfers group meets twice a month – at 4 p.m. on the second and fourth

Fridays from mid-April through mid-October. Dennis is there helping each time. His wife, Emily, helps out when needed. The golfers generally play in twosomes, and at least one volunteer goes out with each group. Volunteers tee up the ball and assist in whatever way is needed. During the off season, the Faulks open their home to the players, volunteers, and all their significant others for a winter party. They play Wii golf and Wii bowling. "So much of the benefit comes from the social aspect," says

Dennis.

Many of the disabilities are associated with Parkinson's disease. Other players are post-stroke victims, and some

Dennis said over the 14


years, participants in the program have had 13 different disabilities. The program has served 59 handicapped persons and involved 57 volunteers.

Dennis admires the courage and positive outlook on life he observes in the participants. And, we admire you, Dennis, for your dedication to this valuable community ministry.



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Ruth Hamilton named Moderator of Presbytery of Arkansas

Kirk member Ruth Hamilton will become Moderator of the Presbytery of Arkansas at the 134th presbytery meeting Feb. 17-18 at University of the Ozarks in Clarksville. The installation will be at 6 p.m. on Feb. 17 and visitors are welcome.

Ruth's position is a three-year commitment. She served as Vice-Moderator of Presbytery last year, serves as Moderator of Presbytery this year, and will be Moderator of the Coordinating Team in 2018.

Ruth and her husband, Dave, retired to the Village in late 2001 and became members of the Kirk in January of 2002. Ruth grew up in the Presbyterian Church, but, due to Dave's career moves with Exxon, they were members of a variety of denominations — Disciples of Christ, Congregational, Methodist, and two Union churches while they

Ruth was ordained as a ruling elder in 1991 and has served on

Session several times. At the Kirk she has served on the Education, Mission, Evangelism and Fellowship committees.

She has been moderator of the Kirk's Presbyterian Women and attended the presbytery's two-and-a-half-year program for Commissioned Ruling Elders. Ruth was co-chair of the Pastor Nominating Committee that recommended Bill Bailey to be pastor of Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines.

At the presbytery level Ruth has been on the Christian Education and Nurture Committee, the Committee on Preparation for Ministry and the Committee on Ministry, as well as reading ordination exams for the denomination.

Ruth was a chemist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture for six years, a public school teacher while her three boys were growing up, and lastly a Director of Children's Ministry at a Presbyterian church in Houston.

During that time she had the opportunity to go to Austin Theological Seminary to

take the course work for Christian Educator certification.


> Ruth found a passion for hands-on mission work after learning Spanish in the five years she lived in Bogota, Columbia. For

the next 11 years, she and Dave traveled to Guatemala several weeks

a year to help with logistics and translation for Faith in Practice medical mission teams. She and Dave also helped start the Arkansas Presbyterian Cursillo/Pilgrimage renewal program.

"I'm honored to work and serve with my Presbyterian brothers and sisters in Christ," said Ruth. "It's with joy that I embrace the vision of the presbytery to 'make visible the body of Christ."

Tai Chi at the Kirk is good for your mind and your body

Each Tuesday from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m., a group of Kirk members and other Villagers practices the ancient art of Tai Chi in the Kirk's Hoffius Hall.

This meditative martial art – which features slow, gentle movements and deep breathing – is a traditional Chinese mind-body practice that traces its roots back thousands of years. In addition to its ancient origins, there's modern-day evidence it can help you stay healthy, especially when it comes to caring for your joints and improving balance.

"The biggest improvement I see in classes is better balance, along with overall better health," said Kathy Packard, leader of the class and education director of the Oaklawn Center on Aging,

The Center is part of UAMS and the Reynolds Institute on Aging and is funded by the Oaklawn Foundation.

Kathy has been teaching Tai Chi classes, with the help of volunteers, for 13 years and has taught the Kirk class for 8 years. She also teaches two other classes in the Village and four in Hot Springs.

"Kathy is very alert to beginners and has the patience to go over the exercises," said frequent participant Norm Martin. He also likes that his wife, Char, can do the exercises with the help of a chair. "Char enjoys coming for the camaraderie."


Vianne Huff has been taking Tai Chi classes "a long time." She began attending at the Coronado Center once a week and added the class at the Kirk when it began. "Tai Chi is good exercise, and it's fun. Kathy is a wonderful teacher."

Kathy uses exercises developed by Dr. Paul Lam based on his 10 years of research on the health benefits of practicing Tai Chi. Dr. Lam has developed special methods for arthritis, diabetes, back pain and osteoporosis which are recommended by the Center for Disease Control, the Arthritis Foundation, and other organizations.

"I like that his methods are evidence-based," said Kathy.

The free classes are ongoing, and beginners can join in at any time. While the classes are aimed at seniors, Kathy welcomes all ages.

bloody slap. After first outlawing the practice, the church embraced it by replacing bloody goat hide with letters and cards.
