Martha Nielsen honored as 2017 PW Woman of Faith

"I realized as I tried to put my faith journey into words that my church involvement and my faith journey were not necessarily linked," Martha Nielsen said as she began to relate her story to the women gathered in Hoffius Hall.

"But I want to start by saying I had the benefit of being essentially 'raised in the church.""

Martha was dedicated as an infant in a Baptist church in Kansas City, Mo. When she was in second grade, her family moved to Junction City, Kan., and joined a Presbyterian church she attended through high school.

She went to Sunday school, youth group, church camp, and sang in the choir, but she never really thought much about her personal relationship with God.

When it came time during junior high to join the Presbyterian Church, she was upset that her parents hadn't baptized her as a baby like all her other peers in the communicants' class.

The controversy intensified when Martha's mother, a Baptist at heart, wanted Martha to be immersed at the local Disciples of Christ church instead of being sprinkled. Martha declared she would not be "dunked under water" at somebody else's church, so she was sprinkled like a Presbyterian.

Now, she says she is glad because she can truly "remember her baptism"! *Continued on page 4*

June 4: Pentecost Sunday and church birthday

According to the church's calendar, June 4 is a very important date – Pentecost.

Pentecost is the Greek name for the Jewish Festival of Weeks (*Shavuot*), a harvest festival in ancient Israel. For the rabbis, *Shavuot* is celebrated as the day God gave Israel the Torah.

For Christians, Pentecost marks the end of the great "Fifty Days" and is celebrated as "the birthday" of the Church and the giving of the Holy Spirit. No longer physically present, Jesus is now present through the power of the Spirit, filling and empowering the church to bear witness to Christ's resurrection and the work of the Kingdom.

In the Book of Acts, it is the Spirit that leads the disciples out from hiding, into the streets of Jerusalem to bear witness to Christ's living presence. Even when the magistrates threatened them to keep silent, it was the Spirit that empowered them to be faithful witnesses.

Over and over again, in the Bible as well as in Church



history, it is the Spirit that leads the church into mission and outreach, overcoming our timidity and resistance. It is the Spirit today who continues to push and prod us to be faithful when we would just as soon remain safe and comfortable. On June 4, we will join Christians all over the world in worship, with prayers and hymns, in hearing Scripture read and preached in celebration of the church's "birthday." May this Pentecost season be a time of renewal and discernment for us all as we listen for the

Spirit's call in our lives.

Flood damage means we need your help

Massive flooding in areas of Arkansas and surrounding states caused severe losses of property and, in many cases, loss of life, for many families. We have been asked by the Presbytery of Arkansas to step up and help the affected communities recover.

In the past we have filled disaster buckets and sent them to Church World Services at Ferncliff. They were then shipped to the areas in need. These buckets are still needed. We have several buckets in the storage building in the back parking lot.

However, many other items are needed to help clean up and get families back to a somewhat normal life. The following items are requested: shovels, mops, trash cans, garden rakes, cleaning buckets, paper goods (toilet paper, paper towels, paper plates, plastic utensils), towels, and hygiene kits.

The drop-off station in our area is First Presbyterian Church in Hot Springs. The contact person is Candy at (501) 623-6668, Ext 117.

If you have filled disaster buckets, they can be dropped off at the Kirk. They will be taken to Ferncliff.

In the past, some members have found it easier to give money to the Kirk. Checks should be marked for disaster buckets. The money will then be used to purchase supplies for the buckets. If you wish to fill buckets, there will be a list of what goes into each bucket.

Prayer life deepened in time of serious illness

Continued from page 1 She married in her senior year of college and joined the Disciples of Christ church she had attended occasionally with her sorority's house mother. She remained in that denomination over the course of 35 years which included four different moves, ending in Lincoln, Neb.

"That church family in Lincoln became a saving grace in my life when they saw me through a divorce after 28 years of marriage," she said.

She moved to Omaha, Neb., where she had been commuting to work, and three years later married Jay Nielsen. They came to Hot Springs Village for their wedding so they could be married by her older brother, the Rev. Dr. Mike Seitz, pastor of the Kirk at that time.

After all her years of church attendance, Martha's faith journey took a major turn when she was diagnosed in 2003 with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. This eventually led to a stem-cell transplant and radiation treatments. She was given only a 15 percent chance of living.

During this stressful time, her prayer-life deepened, and her relationship with God grew. She has written about her experiences:

"Today, in large part due to my cancer experience, I can say with certainty, I not only *believe* there is a God,

but I *know* there is a God who watches over me and takes care of me at all times, whether I deserve it or not.

"It is not because I was healed. It is because every time I thought I couldn't stand any more bad news or go through one more treatment, I would ask God for help, and invariably something would happen or someone would show up and provide exactly what I needed to keep going."

Martha and Jay moved to the Village in 2012 and soon became active members of the Kirk.

They became co-Shepherd Group leaders with Bob and Judy Corwin their first two years, and Martha has been the Bible Study Leader for Circle 2 since January 2013. She is moderator of the Congregational Care Committee, and each month she and Jay help deliver Greenhorn meals for our homebound members.

Martha is active in Arkansas Presbyterian Pilgrimage and volunteers for Arkansas Hospice, providing respite care for those taking care of their loved ones at home.

Martha Nielsen's faith is evident in everything she does, and we are thrilled to honor her as the 2017 PW Woman of Faith.

Speakers show the way at PW Spring meeting

On Saturday morning, April 22, Kirk members Rosalyn Halbert, Carol Sue Williams and Madelyn Young met with many other Presbyterian women from across Arkansas for their annual PW Presbytery Spring Gathering. The women of First Presbyterian Church in Hot Springs hosted the event.

Participants enjoyed a beautiful worship service, including Communion.

The Rev. Elizabeth Gabbard, minister at First Presbyterian Church in Arkadelphia, delivered the sermon, "As We Have Been Taught." She cited the many women who have gone before us – faithful women in the Bible and faithful women in our own lives – who have led us to trust in God's love.

Following the service, Kathy Ratcliff from Westover Hills Presbyterian Church in Little Rock spoke about their PW group's literacy program at the Pulaski County Detention Center. The women help inmates increase their reading and writing skills, and she related many delightful experiences.

Then Lyn Whaley, retired executive director at Vera Lloyd Presbyterian Home in Monticello, introduced a former resident, Bob Scott, who spoke about his life when he was a child and teen at Vera Lloyd. He's now a retired Little Rock businessman with a loving family, and he credits the staff at Vera Lloyd for setting him on the right path in life.

A short business meeting followed these presentations. Among the slate of officers installed for the PW Presbytery Coordinating Team, 2017-2018, is our own Carol Sue Williams, who will continue in her role as Cluster III Leader.

The day's keynote speaker was the Rev. Laura Fleetwood, Honorable Retired Minister in the PC(USA) who now lives in Bentonville. Her presentation, "What Does It Mean to Be a Faithful Christian in a World of Many Religions?" encouraged us to learn more about our sisters in other faiths, and she focused on Islam.

Ignorance of what true Muslims believe leads us to fear them, she said. She related stories of her interactions with many loving, faithful Muslims in northwest Arkansas, and she drew a sharp contrast between the vast majority of Muslims in the world and the radical terrorists who dominate the news.

She cited an excerpt from *Presbyterian Principles for Interfaith Dialogue*: "Christians are called to relate to people of other faiths in full humility, openness, honesty, and respect."

A delicious buffet lunch and a wonderful time of fellowship ended the day's activities with our many Arkansas "sisters in the faith." PW ends their year with Bible lesson, birthday offerings and a bountiful salad luncheon

The focus of this year's Bible study has been the Apostle Paul's letter to the Philippians.

In his presentation, Pastor Bill discussed the overall theme of the

letter, Paul's thank-you to the small church he had founded on his second missionary journey.

While in prison, Paul had received gifts of money brought from Philippi by Epaphroditus, a Gentile convert. While Paul appreciated their gifts, he also assured them he had learned the secret of living with little or with plenty.

"I can do all things through him who strengthens me," Paul told them. But their gifts were pleasing to God, and for that, he was grateful. During the worship

service, Kirk PW presented

their gifts for this year's Birthday Offering. They will go to:

• The Navajo Water Project in New Mexico to provide a runningwater system for families without running water.

• The Family Justice Center in South Carolina, serving victims of domestic violence.

• The First Hand Aid Rural Clinic Development Initiative to establish six medical clinics in partnership with, and located at, Presbyterian churches in rural Cuba.

Following the service, the women adjourned to Hoffius Hall for lunch and presentation of the 2017 PW Woman of Faith. Martha Nielsen received a standing ovation as her name was announced and many loving hugs after she spoke about her journey of faith. (See related article on pages 1 and 4)

Changing attitudes help you discover miracles

About 70 Kirk members and guests gathered in Hoffius Hall on April 27 to vicariously share a pilgrimage with the Rev. Dr. Debbie Freeman, a Presbyterian minister.

Dr. Freeman shared with us her 590-mile, 35-day trek along the ancient Camino de Santiago, beginning in the Pyrenees at the border of France and Spain and ending at the Compostela Cathedral in Galicia, Spain, which houses the shrine of the Apostle James. She walked an impressive 13 to 20 miles each day.

She took her journey in spring 2015 and intends to go back again this year. This time, her daughter will accompany her. It was a remarkable physical challenge, and it was obviously a spiritual growth experience for her.

Debbie, as she prefers to be called, began the day-long program at the Kirk by showing the full-

length film *The Way*, starring Martin Sheen. In the film, Tom (Sheen), an ophthalmologist, is playing golf in California when he learns that his son Daniel has died in an accident while walking the Camino.

Daniel and Tom had argued just before Daniel left for his trek. He

told his dad, "You don't choose a life, you live one." This was wisdom that Tom didn't understand at the time. Tom decided to finish the walk "for both of us."

He carried a box of Daniel's ashes with him, which led to several misadventures.

The trek took him through towns and beautiful countryside, staying at designated inns along the way. Tom began his trek alone. Then an unusual group of four – an American (Tom), a French woman, an Irish man and a Dutch man – slowly morphed into a community of friends.

Each person had a reason for walking the Camino. Tom wanted to finish his son's walk. Another had writer's block. One wanted to lose weight. One hoped to quit smoking. As the plot develops, we see deeper reasons unveiled for each walker.

They say miracles happen on Camino. If a transformation of attitude and facing one's underlying "issues" is a miracle, we certainly see that occur. Debbie suggested that "if you go with some question, you usually have the answer; you just haven't listened."

After a tasty lunch of sliders and fixings prepared by the Kirk Greenhorns, Debbie talked about her experience on the walk. She had beautiful slides to *Continued on page 9*

Her experiences taught her two unexpected things: the patience of walking with others, and the joy of letting go of things one doesn't need, thereby learning to do with less.

Her motivation for the walk was, in part, because she wanted a challenge. When she preaches, she

ends each sermon with a new challenge for her congregation. She applies this to herself as well.

Her challenge to us was: "Understanding that we are all on journeys, whether they take us across the world or down the street: pray for each other, help each other, spend time in community with each other and with God."

Several persons in the audience said they were interested in walking the Camino de Santiago. Maybe we will have a future program, featuring some of our own! In the meantime, you may borrow a DVD copy of The Way from the Kirk library and enjoy the walk in the comfort of your home.

Summer Book Club has two titles to discuss

For the second year in a row, the Kirk Education Committee is sponsoring a Summer Book Club each Wednesday morning in July and August. The first meeting will be from 9-10:30 a.m. July 5 in the library. The final meeting will be Aug. 30.

As before, iced tea and "crumpets" will be served.

The first book to be read and discussed is James Baldwin's Go Tell It on the Mountain. The second will be Creation Untamed: The Bible, God, and Natural Disasters by Terence E. Fretheim.

The first is a semiautobiography. The second is an edited series of addresses delivered by a Princeton theology professor to an audience at Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City. James Baldwin was an African-American, Harlem-born essayist, poet, novelist and race advocate. His own experience as the adopted son of a Pentecostal preacher in the early 1930s is the backdrop of this fictional boy's story.

"Everyone had always said that John would be a preacher when he grew up, just like his father. Not until the morning of his fourteenth birthday did he begin to think about it, and by then it was already too late," Baldwin wrote.

With this intriguing opening paragraph, the story of this boy's spiritual, sexual and moral selfdiscovery and possible "selfinvention" begins.

Some who read this article may be turned away by "theological professor" and "seminary lecture." There is no denying the second book in this summer's series will be challenging. But the topic itself is puzzling and plagues all of us. Where, what, when, and how does the God we believe we know fit into the midst of the bold headlines and TV sound bites?

The major premise of the professor is that God might have made the world "good" and we who inhabit it "good," but neither the world nor humanity is "perfect." He wants and expects us to have a part with him in completing the work.

Intriguing? Where better to engage such issues than with a group of fellow believers. Come and join us in exploring these ideas.
