Since then, Denny has collected some 60 flags, all representing particular times in the history of the United States.

General Assembly meeting in St. Louis

Many of you are aware that the 223rd General Assembly of our Presbyterian Church (USA) will be gathering June 16-23 in St. Louis.

Some 2,500 persons, including commissioners elected in each of our denomination's 173 presbyteries, as well as other observers and youth advisors, national and international delegates, will assemble.

This continues a tradition begun in 1789 with the first General Assembly in Philadelphia.

The General Assembly is our highest governing body and represents the "connected" nature of our synods, presbyteries, Sessions and congregations in the Presbyterian Church (USA).

Presbyterian congregations are not "lone ranger" churches, independent of each other. Instead, we are, all of us, connected to and accountable to each other.

This year's Assembly will be full of activities: Business sessions, committee meetings, an exhibit hall, daily worship services and mission tours sponsored by the local churches.

As in previous years, there are a number of overtures that have the potential to unite and/or divide church members.

The overtures will provoke a great deal of discussion and energy. It is important to remember the Assembly is not just the national staff in Louisville, Ky.





It consists of clergy and elder commissioners from local churches all over the country – people just like you and me. And like us, they do not always agree on theology and what is best for the church.

The Assembly's pronouncements are intended to speak *to* the church, not necessarily *for* everyone in the church. Let us continue to pray that God might grant all of us "wisdom and courage for the living of these days." As brothers and sisters in Christ, let us seek to discern common ground as well as where God is leading us together in mission and service.

Fifteen years ago, Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines began honoring its Scottish heritage with the Kirkin' o' the Tartans.

Every three years since then, the Kirk has celebrated on a Sunday in September with bagpipers, tartans, and a high tea with traditional Scottish treats.

This year the tradition continues on Sunday, Sept. 16, as Kirk members carry family tartans from Scotland, Ireland and Wales escorted by the Lyon College Pipe and Drum Band.

Presbyterians began celebrating Kirkin' o' the Tartans in 1941 when the Saint Andrew's Society of Washington, D.C., held the first ceremony at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church.

This isn't an ancient ritual transported to the United States from Scotland, as many assume. It does have its roots in the clan system which ruled the highlands of Scotland for centuries.

Every year, the different clans would gather and dedicate the family (clan) to God for the coming year. After the battle of Culloden in 1746, the clan system came to an end. Bagpipe music was banned by the English, and wearing or displaying the tartan was punishable by death.

After abolition of the tartan in Scotland, clansmen took to carrying swatches of the material to church concealed on their person. At some point in the service, the clergyman would touch their bit of tartan. Thus, with no overt signal given, an underground kirkin' would take place.

lot of the history is lost or replaced by myth.

His presentations in Hot Springs Village began as a kind of a fluke.

He belonged in the Village Genealogical Society. When a program presenter cancelled, he volunteered to put together a program on flags.

From there it mushroomed, becoming more and more popular.

Denny has given dozens of programs in the Village, Hot Springs and even Texas. Nursing homes, patriotic groups, churches and schools are popular venues. His most recent program was April 14 at Good Samaritan.

An illustrated, organized notebook he has developed is taken to each presentation and forms the basis of his talks.

"There wasn't much interest in the American flag until the Civil War began," Denny says. Prior to that, interest was in local flags.

After the Betsy Ross flag, Vikings, Columbus and French flags were all flown here. When the Revolutionary War began, we had no official flag so many flags were put together by families and groups.

Some were representing battles. The Navy had its own flag.

When the Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776, we had no official flag. So in June, 1777, the Flag

For more than 10 years, beautiful prayer shawls have been made by eight to 10 dedicated and talented Kirk women. More than 50 shawls are lovingly made each year and given to individuals whose life circumstances have rendered them in need of the warm and comforting overture.

The names of those in our congregation experiencing distress from things like hospitalization, loss of a spouse, separation from family members, or who are homebound and otherwise in need of comfort, are collected by Pastor Bill Bailey, Elder Leader Sylvia Tate, Congregational Care Committee Moderator Sally Fink, or Visitation Coordinator Janie Smith.

The Kirk also gives shawls to hospices in the area. The shawls dedicated last month, for example, will be delivered to Arkansas Hospice, CHI St. Vincent Hospice and Dierksen Hospice by Carolyn Kane and Barbara Keegan.

If you have knitted or crocheted and have a desire to get involved in this caring, comforting ministry, look no farther. Your contribution would be most appreciated.

Creating a prayer shawl is a great use of leftover yarn, a good rehabilitation for carpel tunnel surgery and a stress reliever. It provides the satisfaction of giving a gift of your time and talents to someone who is in need of solace.

Jane Garrison created shawls for the church a few years ago. She
