The Finance Committee is working on the 2019 budget. The generosity of Kirk members has always allowed us to support our many outreach missions. This outreach is important to our congregation, the Session and the Finance Committee.

Our internal mission includes all the committees serving our congregation, aiding them in growing their faith and the ability to provide for our external missions.

It is projected we will be able to give 20 percent of our budget to external missions in 2019, which confirms the faith-enriching caring heart of the Kirk.

The Finance Committee is happy to report two wonderful designated gifts to the Kirk.

The first is \$30,000 from Pat Ormsbee in honor of her late husband, Kenneth Maack. This is to fund a scholarship, toward secondary education, for Kirk members, employees and their families.

The second is a \$100,000 gift given anonymously to the Luke 12:48 fund. This fund supports Vera Lloyd, Ferncliff and Kirk Education. Articles on pages 7 and 13 of this newsletter describe the two gifts.

This year we have had several unbudgeted expenses.

Three air conditioning units failed and had to be replaced. The organ needed repairs. Trees needed to be removed to protect existing sidewalks and improve safety.

Our parking lot became slippery and had to be resealed to protect the safety of all who come to the Kirk. We have had some water issues in the building; they continue to be addressed.

It cost more than \$50,000 to take care of these unbudgeted items.

Our building is at an age where upkeep and repairs and replacements are needed. The Finance Committee has been proactive. We do have reserve funds to cover current expenses.

Members who came before us provided us a beautiful building, which they paid for in record time. Now it's our responsibility to keep it beautiful and allow us to continue our ministry.

World Communion Sunday is on the first Sunday of October. This year it falls on Oct. 7. We will join with Christians all over the world as we come to our Lord's table and celebrate our unity in Christ.

This tradition originated in 1933 at the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Penn.

Shadyside was then under the pastoral leadership of Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr, who served from 1913 through the end of World War II. From the humble beginning 85 years ago, World Communion Sunday was adopted by the National Council of Churches and has spread to churches throughout the world.

Evacuation Be aware of what you should do in emergency

"In event of an emergency, please proceed to the nearest exit and depart the building."

You may have heard similar words while attending a program at the Woodlands or some other venue. But are you aware the Kirk has a recommended evacuation plan in place?

The plan, which is posted in the narthex near the sound booth, is shown above.

Study it carefully, noting the egress to follow from the different areas. Since most of us regularly sit in the same area, take special note of what route you should follow if there is a fire or some other catastrophic event.

Remember these key instructions:

• Exits are clearly designated. Two of them are the doors on the north (Asturias) side of the sanctuary.

• Don't panic and start running. Instead walk briskly to your exit.

• Don't use the elevator.

• Be sensitive to those with mobility problems. Help them leave the building.

• Move away from the building by going to the main (west) parking lot. Remember: Emergency vehicles may be arriving, so stay out of their way.

• Don't return to the building until cleared by proper authority.

I'm reminded of these words from the emergency procedures section of an aircrew operating manual: STOP-THINK-COLLECT YOUR WITS. Keep those words in mind if the Kirk has a crisis situation.

In future months, we'll cover such topics as "Tornado Safety." Don't fail to miss the next exciting episode.

The 139th meeting of the Presbytery of Arkansas will be Oct. 19-20 at Ferncliff Camp and Conference Center. It will seek action on Presbyterian constitutional matters and fellowship in a spirit of love toward other Presbyters (members) with the acknowledgment of God's spirit of guidance over all.

One item of business is about politics and the pulpit.

As a nonprofit organization, the church is not allowed to campaign for those seeking office, but there are nuances to this. Should the church's constitution address this directly? As you can imagine, this should provide a lively discussion.

The Kirk in the Pines Session members along with the Pastor make the governing decisions for the local congregation within the guidelines of this PC (USA) constitution.

The Presbytery meeting opens with a worship service. An important feature of the meetings is an open worship service before getting down to business.

There are three Presbytery meetings each year, usually rotating through various churches within the region. This is the first meeting will be at Ferncliff and our Kirk congregation has volunteered to serve as co-hosts. Our Session elects a representative from within our congregation to attend the meeting along with the Pastor Bill Bailey as representation for the local congregation.

It will take a concerted effort and a lot of volunteers to do our part for the meeting.

The Session overwhelmingly voted to support this outreach to our Presbytery, and we should be proud to be a part of a church known by all for its spirit of service to the denomination.

Working on the Kirk's sound board requires good ear and the right touch

The "Behind the Scenes" column in May featured Robert Sonnen, head of the sound board crew. Here is "the "rest of the story," as Paul Harvey used to say.

The back-up sound crew consists of four men and one lady. With Robert in the rotation, each of the crew members usually works the sound board once a month. Robert prepares a schedule annually so everyone knows in advance when it's their turn.

Nancy Patton operates the board for special events, including memorial services and PW programs. She had eight years of experience at her previous church and has been serving at the Kirk for four years.

David Rosenquist had no experience with sound equipment before accepting a position on the crew five years ago. He likes to double check the service is being recorded and saved on the computer. It can then be transferred to a CD for those who want a copy of the sermon.

Jim Erickson did have prior experience with a sound board. When asked to serve in this capacity at the Kirk four years ago, he readily accepted. When operating the equipment on Sunday morning, he is careful to what he calls "ride the line" between the volume of the speaker and feedback. If the volume is too loud, "feedback" can be unpleasant to the listener's ears.

Although he missed most of last year because of a hospitalization, Bill Worthley has been on the crew for two years. Since he had no experience with sound equipment, he says with a wink the only reason Barron Gage asked him to be on the crew was because he sat next to him in church.

Barron is Moderator of the Building Committee. Managing the sound equipment is his responsibility. Last year when Bill had to take an extended leave of absence, Barron pitched in and learned to operate the equipment. Although not in the regular rotation, he continues to fill in when needed.

The job is more complicated than just "flipping switches." All the equipment was replaced two years ago with a computer and everyone was re-trained.

Robert Sonnen said the most important part of the job is to listen so you will know which button to push or adjustment to make.

Our thanks to these devoted sound crew members for making our sanctuary experiences pleasantly audible.
