The nominees were selected by a nomination committee made up of Clerk of Session Jerral Johnson, Session member Nancy Patton, Woodie Barefield, Betty Reece and Dennis Zymboly.

The congregation will vote on the slate at a Called Congregational Meeting in October. The elders will be installed in December. Once the date for the congregational meeting is set, it will be announced in the newsletter and Sunday bulletin.

Also up for approval at the October meeting will be next year's nominating committee: Clerk of Session Jerral Johnson, Session member Vicki Rosenquist, Barb Henry, Jim Hess and Pat Hightower.

The new elders will assume their positions in January and will serve for three years.

Besides serving as committee moderators, Session elders are the ruling body of the Kirk, setting and voting on policy at monthly Session meetings and attending an annual two-day retreat at Ferncliff in the fall.


#### **Donation by June Moore:**


A donation by June Moore enabled the church to purchase and install a hearing loop. This will improve the hearing of those wearing hearing aids.



## Lowell Gardner to head Communication

A native Iowan, Lowell Gardner moved from Council Bluffs to Cedar Rapids at the age of nine.

Calvary Baptist Church, where his cousins attended, sponsored a softball team. However, he had to attend at least one service a week to be on the team, so Lowell began going to Sunday school with several friends.

"Through this, I was introduced to God's saving grace and embraced it for myself through faith in Jesus Christ," Lowell said.

He received a B.A. degree from Bethel College in St. Paul, Minn., with a major in English literature and a minor in philosophy. After two years as a social worker with Ramsey County Social Services, he completed his theological degree at Bethel Seminary in 1963.

Lowell served pastorates in Cumberland and Ashland, Wis., and Avon Lake, Ohio. He also worked two years on the editorial staff of the Baptist General Conference Publishing Department in Chicago. He then served three years as manager of Wood Lake Baptist Camp in Grantsburg, Wis.

In 1980, Lowell became district supervisor with the St. Paul, Minn. *Dispatch/Pioneer Press* newspaper from which he retired in 1997 after 17 years.

While serving as pastor, Lowell worked as chairman of Church Planting for Wisconsin/Upper Michigan Peninsula District. He was also a member of the Education Committee of the Baptist General Conference.

Lowell and Sharon were married in 1990, and have been members of the Kirk since 2008. He has served on the Evangelism, Congregational Care, Communication, and Education committees and has led the Kirk's Summer Book Club for two years. He also writes the Carnegie Corner column for the Kirk's monthly newsletter, *A Voice in the Pines*.

"I support the Presbyterian Statement of Faith, the ministry of this church and the pastorate of Bill Bailey," Lowell said.

Harry Wakefield grew up on a small farm in Nashville, Ark. He attended the University of Arkansas and graduated with a degree in chemistry. In his junior year he met Becky Carter, who shortly after graduation became Mrs. Wakefield.

His first job was working as a food scientist and qualitycontrol manager with the Coca Cola Co. in Albuquerque, N.M. During his career, he and Becky lived in numerous places, including Texas, New Mexico


Harry served on the Mission Committee and found it a joy to work with each of its members. He has been overwhelmed at the level of support the Kirk gives to our mission partners.

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# New 60-page booklet published to help us cope with those hard times

# Bible classes resume Sept. 6 with a nod toward topical issues of the day

Our fall classes will soon begin.

The **Wednesday Bible Class** will be topical this year. Rather than our normal practice of working through a single book of the Bible, we will take a topical approach under the title: *What Does the Bible Teach About* ...?

The plan is to consider different passages in both the Hebrew and Christian Bible. We will read these different texts, by different authors, in different books, written in different historical contexts, listening to different perspectives about important topics of their day as well as our day.

Most of these passages will be more or less controversial as we consider the ways both Jews and various Christian traditions have read these texts.

What does the Bible say about politics?

What does the Bible say about marriage?

What does the Bible say about the roles of men and women?

What does the Bible say about killing? War? Capital punishment? Abortion? And a host of other topics.

I understand many of these topics are lightning-rod issues. We will, together, wrestle with how others have read these scriptures over the last 2,000 years. Hopefully, we will find it helpful to see, not just what the Bible actually says, but how both Jews and Christians have read these texts and applied them to their lives over the years.

The Wednesday Bible Classes resume at 9 a.m. Sept. 6.


In celebration of the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Martin Luther's 95 Theses, the **Thursday Class** will be entitled *The Reformation*.

## Early risers gets Kirk ready on Sundays

When we arrive at the Kirk for worship each Sunday, the lights are on, coffee is brewing, and the building is warm or cool, depending on the season.

It's something we all take for granted, but it doesn't happen magically. Behind the scenes, there is careful planning and organization to make sure the building is open and coffee is made before the first parishioner sets foot in the door.

Darell Fisher is the man behind this smooth operation. Darell recruits and supervises a crew of eight to 10 members who take turns opening the church by 8:45 a.m. and locking doors and switching off lights after everyone's gone home.

The person in charge that morning follows a checklist outlining which doors to unlock first (Hoffius Hall), which lights to turn on and interior doors to open, and even includes taking a ride in the elevator to make sure it's working properly.

And while brewing coffee may sound simple, the setup in Hoffius Hall can take up to 30 minutes to complete. The crew gets the coffee setup going before heading off to unlock the rest of the doors and turn on fans and lights in the hallways, bathrooms and sanctuary.

By the time this is done, it's back to the coffee pot to finish that chore.

When everyone's gone after coffee hour, all exterior doors are locked, lights turned off, hearing devices checked to make sure they're turned off and the office door checked to be sure it's locked.

Besides Darell, the current security crew includes Gary Clark, Joyce Leeming, Frank Leeming, Ted Smith, E.J. Pangle, Don Van Stone, Jerral Johnson, and Dick Massey.

Next time you see one of these dedicated members, make sure you thank them for making sure everything's in order for Sunday worship service and securely closed up after it's over.

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## Kirk Choir returning on Sunday, Sept. 3

The Kirk Choir will return to its regular role in worship on Sunday, Sept. 3. We will sing a choral call to worship, anthem, and benediction response.

The role of singing in worship is not only traditional at the Kirk but throughout Western religions since the earliest Bible times. Psalms and hymns were part of early Jewish synagogue services. As Christian worship developed, the early church adopted similar components in its worship.

Additional styles of music and singing were incorporated into worship as the Christian church engaged with cultures beyond its Jewish heritage. Words of the liturgy were set to familiar folk or pagan tunes to help the congregants participate.

For many centuries, melodies sung in worship were simple lines, sung by a leader and echoed by congregants – called an *antiphon*. Missionaries of the early church introduced local singing styles into worship and adopted them throughout the order of worship. Later, dedicated choirs were added during worship as singing lines became more complex.

While the earliest churches frowned on the use of instruments (they were thought to lead to debauchery), instrumental accompaniments eventually made their way into worship, most likely on stringed instruments such as the lyre or harp. In the Middle Ages, other instruments, such as flutes, horns, and organs began to accompany singing.

The introduction of the organ into worship in the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> centuries began a centuries-long development of ever more creative music for solo voices, choirs, and instruments of many types.

This continued in Roman Catholic Church practices, but following the Reformation, Protestant churches were not as keen to allow such "vulgarities." The two

overarching rules were: 1) only the Psalms were to be sung in worship, and 2) the only instrument allowed would be the human voice.

In the early 19th century, the Rev. R. William Ritchie of St. Andrew's Church, Glasgow, Scotland, attempted to introduce an organ into his church, but he was informed by the Presbytery of Glasgow that "the use of organs in the public worship of God is contrary to the law of the land and constitution of our Established Church."

In America, the Presbyterian Church eventually allowed these restrictions to be relaxed, and during the last two centuries, the music of American churches has become a creative laboratory.

We are fortunate the Kirk's congregation loves music. The rich history of the Kirk includes an active music ministry – one that continues to grow even today.

The musical selections you hear in worship at the Kirk span many different styles and periods. We strive to select music which closely aligns with the liturgy for the day, and we sing and play it for one purpose only: to enhance the worship of the listener.

As choir members or instrumentalists, we want to offer our best for the Lord. Please consider joining us in any aspect of the music ministry. You will be welcomed with open arms and glad hearts.

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## Check out harrowing tale of Ebola survival

Ebola virus disease (EVD) is a serious illness associated with head, joint and muscle aches, fever, weakness, diarrhea, vomiting, stomach pain and lack of appetite.

It is one of several hemorrhagic fevers (related to blood flow) caused by a viral infection. Depending on the strain of virus, its fatality rate can be up to 90 percent.

The transmission most often passes from other primate animals to humans through blood, bodily fluids and tissue of infected animals or other infected humans. The time between being infected and the occurrence of symptoms varies from two to 21 days. There is no known vaccine at this time, but several are in development.

EVD was first specifically identified in 1976. During the early years, significant outbreaks were

confined to isolated areas, small villages with a limited number of friends, neighbors and families.

In 2014, that changed. A major occurrence of cases began to appear in large urban areas of Guinea, Sierra Leone and Liberia, all in West Africa.



On June 11 that year, a phone call was received at the hospital in Monrovia, Liberia, where Dr. Kent Brantly served as medical missionary with World Medical Missions. Two patients with Ebola symptoms were being transported from another part of the country to the isolation unit of this 55-bed hospital in the capital city.

Dr. Brantly covered himself in the protective gear he had planned for but had prayed he would never need to use. Barely six weeks later, he received the news that he had contracted the dreaded virus, in spite of all the precautions.

His amazing experience of illness, treatment and survival are chronicled along with those of his wife Amber, in an extraordinary new book, *Called for Life*, available in our church library. Check it out.
